I would also like to say a personal "thank you" to Don for the kind way he welcomed me into the job, and it has been a very gentlemanly "hand-over" of the baton! Our committee has also changed this year, and again on behalf of all, I would like to thank our hard working outgoing officers, Vince, Dave and James. We welcome in Steve Turner, John West and Geoff West, whilst Andrew has been returned to office. Operation's Report

This year, we have a change to the "Ops." management. Dave is taking a break from "Ops." duties and I have been joined by Geoff and Andrew, so we are spreading the load a little.

This should ensure that, even when one or the other of us is away for work or holidays, for 99% of the running season an Ops. Manager is present. Our thanks to Dave, and a welcome to Andrew and a welcome back to Geoff!

As I write this, we have just started our running season and just finished our Easter weekend. Thanks to John Ely and the excellent publicity we received in at least three newspapers, and thanks to some fine and often warm weather (not though Easter Sunday!). Also thanks, not least, to all those who turned out to drive, guard, man the station, and assist in many ways, we carried record numbers of passengers and are off to a cracking start to the 2005 season.

It is a tribute to the cleanliness of the engines that the track is still very clean and dry and grease/oil free. Your Ops. Managers are very grateful and ask everyone to please continue to religiously clean all wheels before using the track and shed road.

We were also impressed that everyone kept to a nice, steady pace when passenger hauling. Last year we had particular concern, when running our "Sunday", anticlockwise, direction, with the speed some trains were coming around the "clubhouse bend" and over the point and traverser. So far, much better this year! I would like to remind everyone that, for safety's sake, this bend, (running anticlockwise), should be taken at only walking pace. You must be able to stop your train within the distance you can see to be clear! Nuff sed!

A final note to all drivers who may not yet be aware of the small modification to the call-on signal. In the last year or so, when running three or four passenger trains we have had the option of setting the "call-on" signal to continuous yellow to allow trains onto the station section and avoid "back-up" around the track. Whilst successful, it did perhaps encourage drivers to take the "clubhouse bend" too fast knowing that there would not be a "double" red facing them by the steaming bays. This year we will no longer generate this system whilst running in the "Sunday" direction, although a permanent "call-on" may still be used when running "Saturday" direction, especially on visitor days when so many engines may be on the track together. (We feel it can be used safely in this direction, without encouraging speeding, as the signal is so close to the station platform).

Now, in the "Sunday" direction, our signals department has "moved" the "call-on" track cut-out section to the end of the station platform. Provided all trains in the station section are now within the station itself, the "call-on" will generate and another train can enter the section. If a train is waiting to enter the station or there is any problem (derailment etc) on the stretch from the steaming bay signal to platform, the call-on will not operate and a "double red" will show. Drivers may no longer therefore expect a guaranteed non-stop run around the clubhouse and into the station section, the first part of which is now "signal protected" again.

Wishing everyone a safe and enjoyable season.
